It was a pleasure seeing so many of our USDA affiliates represented at the National Square Dance Convention in Kansas City. We'll summarize the story of our summer with a few numbers: 9,193 miles, 69 days, 22 different states, 3 major square dance conventions. We just received our bar for 36 states and have started our final form on our way to 48 and then the magical 50! It continues to amaze us how welcoming square dancers are and how much fun they have when they get together – whether it's a square or two dancing in a firefighter's hall in New York or more than 3000 avid fans filling the Kansas City Convention Center.

While on our eastern swing in July, we were honored to be able to present the USDA Youth Scholarship Certificate to our 2018 winner: Marina White, from Bear, Delaware. (See photo on page 7—Eastern VP Report) Marina is a fourth generation square dancer and three of those generations – Marina, her parents, and her grandmother – traveled with their club, the 2x4s, to visit the Busy B's Square Dance Club in Brooklawn, NJ where we met up to present the scholarship award. We had several worthy applicants for the USDA Youth Scholarship this year, and the Board of Directors has now approved adding a second scholarship each year should funds allow. The program is primarily supported by donations from dancers and dance organizations, and we were grateful to receive several donations this year at the USDA Annual Meeting. Remember that youth dancers are the future of our activity.

Enjoy a wonderful autumn of crisp nights, fall colors, and of course a square dance or two!

I spent a few weeks in Kansas City, MO for some career training and while I was there I reached that long awaited age of 18. Some friends took me to Kansas to celebrate this big event in my life with some liquid refreshment that was not available to me in MO. My recent comments about staying away from Kansas unless you want to have a bad headache the next day was simply a nostalgic reflection with a twist of humor. I love Kansas. He'd spoken with Dana Schirmer, Executive Director of Callerlab, and shared an overview of Lee's condition that inspired them to do something for this man that has given so much to square dancing. They decided a "Go-Fund-Me" account would be a great way to pay tribute to Lee and help with medical expenses, family travel expenses, etc.

Our "Special Report" in this issue is based on an email from Steve Kopman giving some insight to his Dad, his Dad's love of square dancing, and what it was like growing up in the home of Lee Kopman. EVENTS IN THE EASTERN REGION

Since our report for USDA News, we have attended the 67th National Square Dance Convention in Kansas City, MO and have some exciting news to share. As you may recall, in our last report we spoke about the USDA Youth Program and the Founders Memorial Youth Scholarship. In this article we would like to continue our discussion of youth in square dancing.

National Convention Activities

Let's go back to the 67th NSDC in June of this year. Each year the NSDC hosts set aside a special Youth Hall as a place where the youth dancers can meet, dance, win prizes, and just hang out. This year was not an exception with 56 youth dancers from across the country signed up. USDA hosted a pizza party for these young dancers on Friday evening where information regarding the Founders Memorial Youth Scholarship was shared. USDA also donated three \$50 gift cards, one to be given away each day as part of the prizes available to the youth dancers who participate in the hall. Finally, National Executive Committee Member, Louis Friedlander, held a round table discussion regarding youth dancers on Saturday and a representative from USDA participated in this discussion.

Founders Memorial Youth Fund Scholarship



We had three very qualified applicants this year for the USDA Founders Memorial Youth Fund Scholarship. We are excited to report that this year's 2018 Youth Scholarship Award Winner was Marina White from Bear, Delaware, one of our USDA Eastern Region youth dancers. Marina is a fourth generation member of the 2X4s and Castle Squares square dance clubs, part of the Delaware Valley Federation of Square and Round Dance Clubs. USDA Presidents, LPaul and Sally Schmidt presented her with the scholarship certificate at the Busy B's Square Dance in Brooklawn, NJ on July 11.

How Can You Help?

Unfortunately, we find that many youth dancers don't even know that there is a National organization offering this scholarship. That is the important role each of you share as members of your affiliates – to help us promote the availability of the scholarship and increase the overall awareness of who and what USDA is (and that we ARE NOT the Department of Agriculture!)

The United Square Dancers of America, the national dancers' organization, is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. There is enough money in our scholarship fund to keep the program going for a few more years, but after that we will lose this program without support from our fellow dancers. USDA INSURANCE COORDINATORS NOTES

Hopefully, long before you read this article you will have received from me the 2019 rate which remains the same as 2018 at \$4.75 per dancer. We are very fortunate that Markel was able to give us this rate again. As quoted “Markel has reviewed the loss history and based on the excellent results, 2019 rates will be the same.”

As you know when you enrolled your club for 2018 and your certificate was returned to you, the group being insured (state, federation, association or club) was given a USDA # that was to be put on your request for a certificate form after the name of the group requesting the certificate. We will be continuing that procedure for 2019; HOWEVER, YOU WILL BE RECEIVING A NEW USDA # WHEN YOU ENROLL FOR 2019. DO NOT PUT THE USDA # YOU WERE ASSIGNED FOR 2018 ON ANY FORMS SUBMITTED FOR 2019.

QUESTION? Which insurance forms require a signature and which person is required to sign? **ANSWER** – the only form that needs a signature is the club roster which contain a statement that by signing the club’s representative is agreeing that the club is at that time 100% insured. The person signing should be the person who is responsible for the club roster; it is usually the secretary but can be any person who accepts the responsibility of it being accurate and keeping it updated so that when new members are added this person would know that an insurance fee must be paid so that the club is always 100% insured. This form along with others that you may need is on the USDA web page (usda.org).

There is a new request for a certificate form which was put into use this past year. All spaces on that form should be used when submitting your request. The form requests a mailing address for the group. This mailing address is the one that is put on the form when the yearly enrollment is submitted. The mailing address should remain the same for the entire year. If it has to change for some reason, please inform the insurance coordinator ASAP so that Markel can make that change on their records. This is important since the mailing address is now put on the certificate of insurance and needs to always be accurate.

The end of 2018 is approaching soon. On December 31, 2018 at midnight our insurance for 2018 terminates. If there is an event on New Year’s Eve, please check the ending time of the event as the group having the event may need to get their 2019 enrollment submitted in time for them to get a certificate of insurance for the time on January 1st of their event. Do not submit just a request for a certificate for 2019 as the group’s enrollment must be submitted before a certificate can be issued.

As always, the work you do as insurance chairmen for your organization is appreciated by USDA and your fellow square dancers.

USDA TRAVELER PROGRAM

Do you like to travel? Do you like to attend square dances wherever you go? Then look into the USA Traveler Program! The purpose of the USA traveler program is to promote visitation between dancers in all 50 states by encouraging dancers to visit club dances, festivals, state conventions, or national conventions across state lines and around the United States. The goal – to dance at an event in each of the 50 United States!

A badge and a bar will be awarded to participants after they have visited at least 12 states. The goal is to dance in all 50 states and any participant who visits 48 or 50 states will also be awarded paid admission to the next National Square Dance Convention.

USDA CENTENNIAL AWARD PROGRAM

Are you aware that we have dancers 100 years old that are still active in their dance clubs? Very few of us reach that age, but USDA recognizes and honors those that do with a “Centennial Award”. They will receive a framed certificate of “Recognition and Appreciation” signed by the president and the Regional Vice President of USDA, a “USDA Centennial Award” lapel pin and a special “Feature Article” about them in the USDA NEWS.

USDA YOUTH SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Each year the United Square Dancers of America – the national dancers’ organization – awards a merit-based scholarship to a student who has shown their dedication to the promotion and perpetuation of the total square dance movement, including square dance, round dance, contra and clogging. If you know of a youth dancer who is a high school senior or college freshman that would like to apply for the scholarship, the application form can be downloaded from the USDA website, <http://USDA.org/trifold/ISy0403.pdf>.

Donations are needed to continue making this \$1,000 scholarship available. You can make a donation in memory of a fellow dancer, in honor of a special occasion, or simply because you support youth square dancing. USDA is a 501(c)(3) Public Charities, which qualify for tax deduction status.

USDA HANDICAPABLE PROGRAM

The USDA Handicapable program is monetary in nature, consisting of allocating monies toward the registration fee for eligible Handicapable dancers to attend the National Square Dance Convention. The only requirement is that they must be a Handicapable dancer and a member of a Handicapable club. Any Handicapable club in the United States may apply for these funds. In order to apply for funds, a club contact person must complete the application form and send it to the USDA Handicapable Committee chairperson.

FEATURE ARTICLE

Let us tell you about a wonderful woman that we had the pleasure to meet and talk with. It was on Wednesday, September 12, 2018 at Swingin Singles Square Dance Club in West Allis, Wisconsin. We were there to present the United Square Dancers of America Centennial Dancer Award to **Althea Zimmerman** who turned 100, July 2018. She was accompanied by her daughter, Joy Hooyman.



Althea married the love of her life in 1941. After living in Virginia through the war (1941-1945), they returned to Wisconsin. Althea – “My husband, Jim, and I joined a group of friends from Allis-Chalmers and attended Dale Wagner’s dances on Saturday nights at Calhoun Hall in New Berlin. The hall was packed, and Dale called us all by name. He never had classes. He just told us what to do and we did it with such fun. He probably charged 25 to 30 cents per couple.”

Althea and Jim danced together for many years. Over the years they took lessons several times. Althea – “We joined Lou Snyder’s class in the basement of the church on 76th street, not far from our home and we received a diploma. After retirement, we would go south to Texas in the winter, so we received a diploma from Jerry Haag. We also went to California and received a diploma from Ken Bower. Sometimes we had to look at those diplomas to remember that we should know what we were doing.”

Althea do you have any special or funny memories of a national convention? Althea – “Jim & I attended all state square dance conventions during that time and the 28th National Convention, which was held in Milwaukee at the Arena and Auditorium in June 1979. I have a scrapbook about that convention. There was a Milwaukee Journal-Sentinel article stating that there were about 25,000 dancers. They came by plane, train, bus, cars, and travel trailers that were parked at the fairgrounds. One couple hitchhiked from Boise Idaho with backpacks.

All the clubs in Milwaukee had to do something to make this a success. We were asked to work in Lost & Found. Our first question was from a lady who said her husband was lost. Did we know where he was? Believe it or not, there was room for that purpose and there were a lot of lost spouses in there.”

What has square dancing and square dancers brought to your life? Althea – “In 1987, On our way to Arizona, to spend a winter at a park, and of course square dance we were in an accident and I lost my husband, and things changed in a hurry. Some time later I decided to dance again. Swingin’ Singles Square Dance Club of West Allis welcomed me with open arms and provided wonderful support during this tough time in my life.

Althea what is one thing you would like to share with square dancers?

Althea – “Keep a positive attitude, eat a well-balanced diet and SQUARE DANCE.

Thank you, Althea, for sharing with all of us.

SPECIAL REPORT

The following is an email from Lee Kopman's son Steve, after learning that a "GO FUND ME" account was being established for his Dad.

People can surprise you in ways you can't imagine - In times of need you truly know who your friends are. These are clichés I've heard many times in my life, but to see them come true is nothing short of a miracle.

When I received the call about starting a Go Fund Me account in my Dad's honor, I was moved to tears by the gesture, as were my parents. After all, Lee Kopman's unprecedented contribution to Square Dancing was never really intended. It was, and still is, the joy of his life. It was never about money or how many calls he could write. He just couldn't help himself from creating and improving on the activity he loved most.

I believe it's important that you have some context around the importance my Dad has in the world of Square Dancing. Dad & I have talked on the phone every day since Debbie (wife) & I left Long Island for Knoxville TN in 1981, often twice a day. But lately, because of health issues, my conversations ran through my mom. I knew he was feeling better when I'd call the house and they'd both answer the phone and dad would say, "get off the phone Lilith the boys want to talk". And, of course, we'd talk choreography. That was the staple in our relationship.

We differed on so many things except Square dancing. Dad was a diehard Yankee fan, I loved the Mets. Dad didn't like football, I couldn't wait to watch the (TN) Vols play their college rivals. Dad was a loyal democrat, I was a staunch republican. Dad was a full-time caller, I did my best to keep it an avocation. But somehow, in all my 61 years, we'd only had 1 disagreement. It was square dancing that was our focus, and mostly choreography.

Callers often say to me, "how do you see the resolves to your corners so quickly in a square"? "Easy," I reply, "my dad's Lee Kopman!" I've written before that when I was 5 years old, driving in the car with him, he'd ask me, "If the heads square thru 4 and do a right and left thru, give me 3 steps to get to your corner." I've joked that if I couldn't give him the corner with those parameters, he'd write a new call.

FIVE HUNDRED new calls later, I was deemed a slow learner and HE was the king of choreography. Can you imagine a modern western Square Dance without calling Recycle, Chase Right, Coordinate, Cut the Diamond, Scoot Back or Linear Cycle? Or how about an advanced dance with no Chain Reactions, Motivates, Transfer the Columns, Cast a Shadows, lock Its, Pass & Rolls, Slip, Slides and Swings? And then you hit the C1 level and its Scoot & Plenty, All 8 Recycle, Linear Action, Percolate, Pass the Axle, Rotary Spin & Alter the Wave. That's only a smidgen of the contributions Dad has made to our activity.

In my lifetime names like Babe Ruth, Tiger Woods, Michael Jordan, permeate our lives with stories of how magnificent they were. I often ask myself if baseball, golf and basketball didn't have these gifted athletes would the games have evolved to be what they are today? The answer is yes. But without Lee Kopman, what would square dancing be like? Repetitious to say the least, mundane, banal & tedious comes to mind. Would there even be a "challenge" level in Square Dancing if he'd remained a full time physical education teacher? Not likely. Good, bad or indifferent our activity is what it is today because of his 500+ contributions and the unique and brilliant way he sequenced the calls. And it didn't stop with writing new calls. Did you know my father sits at his computer and spends a minimum of 1-2 hours a day writing choreography every day of the week? Before computers, Dad wrote his sequences using little checker pieces and then wrote them down on index cards. Our finished basement was stacked like a NY skyscraper with those cards. Square Dancing was and is his passion - devoted to the activity like no other.

Over the years I've always had a full-time job. In the early days I made sure I had an occupation that would afford me travel on Friday's, so I could continue the legacy of Kopman's calling at weekends and festivals. Many of those were sharing the stage with him. I felt blessed to be on the stage not with the king of choreography but with my dad. I'll never forget Mike Jacobs coming up to me after a festival where me and my dad called together at the die-hard dance. He had tears in his eyes when he said "never take for granted what you and your dad have because most people never have that father/son magic." I didn't realize until then how special it was for us to work together onstage as if we were one person. We'd play games where I set the dancers up in an unusual position and he'd have to resolve the square. Then he'd do the same to me.

Never once was I nervous that one of us would falter and couldn't find a corner. That just didn't happen in our world. And then we'd step it up and alternate calls- he'd start the sequence and then it was my turn. Then his turn and back to me until we resolved the square. The effortless way we went about this was the magic we had. And every tip ended with a kiss on the cheek.

When I'd say to him, "Dad I've been promoted to a manager position at the bank" he would reply, "Does that keep you from calling?" Or, "Dad I'm now a regional sales manager!" His reply, "Will it stop you from calling?" That's how my dad felt about Square Dancing. He's told me before one of his dreams was for me to become a Square Dance caller. That's how much HE loved the activity.

So, why am I sharing these stories and history with all of you? Something incredible has happened the past few weeks, some good some not. Dad was diagnosed with stage 2 bladder cancer, a very aggressive type that needs attention. When the doctor explained his condition my dad's first response was, "can I still call square dances"? Is anyone surprised at that? There are different options that the family is weighing but being age 85 comes into consideration on all decisions.

We've been blessed with emails, calls and cards from people who are praying for my father's recovery. You will never know how important that is when one faces adversity. Two things in particular have moved us in such profound ways. A caller from NC, Marty Northrop, emailed me and said your dad's selfless contributions to Square Dancing need to be recognized. He'd spoken with Dana Schirmer, the Executive Director of Callerlab, and shared an overview of my dad's condition that inspired them to do something for my folks. They decided a Lee Kopman Go-fund-me account would be a great way to pay tribute to Lee. At first Marty & Dana thought the monies would go to defray expenses but my folks had other ideas. Mom & dad still wanted to give back to the organization they cherish. Their wish: Put 100% of the donations in a fund that helps callers who can't afford to attend a Callerlab convention. And possibly another to help new and up and coming callers attend a caller's school. Would you think anything less from the Kopman's?

The other was a call from the folks at the Rockville Centre Recreation hall on Long Island. Dad's been calling there 3 times a week for over 40 years. They want to dedicate the lobby in his name calling it "Kopman Square." We are all praying he's out of rehab and can attend the ceremony.

I hope none of you have to face the kind of choices my folks are facing with dad's current challenges. Just knowing the power of prayer and people stepping up in times of need is truly a blessing and a gift to us all.





“The Impact Square Dancing Has Had On My Life”

I am a fourth generation square dancer, my great-grandparents, grandmother, parents, and now me. I was born square dancing. I was brought along to square dances and put in a front pouch or backpack on my parents and was danced through the square. One of my fondest memories is when my mom was spun on a swing I would lean way in the back-pack to feel the centripetal force and almost throw off my mom's balance. I've always had a great time at a square dance!


I went everywhere to square dance: the local clubs, WASCA, other festivals ... When I was about 8 months old I wore my first square dance clothes, and I sure loved swishing in my petticoat, and of course the shoes matched the dress. When I was 5-6 years old I told my parents that I wanted to learn how to square dance, so my parents got me into lessons at the 2x4s Square Dance Club. In 2008 I graduated to Plus level and once I graduated my family joined the club. The next year I took Round dance lessons, and 2 years after that I learned Advanced. I am now a member of both 2x4s Square Dance Club and Castle Squares Square Dance Club, and have been dancing with them for years. I am currently the listserve (for 1 ½ years) and theme chairperson (for ½ of a year) for the 2x4s.

The thing I love the most about the square dancing community is the close knit, supportive, and loving friends/club members. Everyone is so kind and is always willing to lend a hand to those in need. When I was little we had a cuer friend, Tim Eum, and he taught me how to count. He would stand in front of me and count “one, two, three, four...” Even though I hid behind my dad's legs I still learned how to count. Other square dancers just wanted me to be in their square, and I would willingly pop up into the square and dance. At WASCA, before I learned how to square dance, one of the youth dancers dragged me into the square.

I don't know how we did it, but we made it through the square without breaking down. One final example I would like to give is how one square dancer at our club made me realize what I wanted to do in my future. A couple of years ago I was debating to become an orthodontist, and I knew this dancer whose brother happened to be an orthodontist. We started talking and it came up that his other brother was a radiologist. I had never heard of a radiologist before so he explained a bit about the field to me, and it sounded so interesting that I came home, did extensive research, and instantly fell in love with radiology. My intention for my future is to become a radiologist.

Everywhere I go to dance there is always a helping hand where someone is: trying to fix broken square, organizing solo rotations, setting up refreshments or decorations, substituting when someone is sick, and the list goes on and on. It amazes me that such a small group of people could be so influential and kind. I look up to certain members in my club: cuers, callers, and other dancers in our area. Square dancing has been my life, not just a part of it, but my entire life. It has helped me figure out what help and compassion look like, what support is, and how to be a better person. Square dancing is my life, and I wouldn't have it any other way.
