## USDA INSURANCE COORDINATORS NOTES Elizabeth Sanders

Greeting Everyone,

Have you registered for the  $72^{nd}$  NSDC to be held in Mobile, AL, June 21 - 24, 2023. If not then it's not too late. There will be two sessions for insurance this year. Thursday, June 22 (9am, Mobile Bay Ballroom 2) and Friday, June 23 (1pm, Grand Bay Ballroom 2). Plan to attend but be sure to check the listings at the convention to make sure there has not been a change in time or location.

There are several important issues that need to be addressed. The first is the insurance portal. There is one time during the year when you can delete a facility and/or a name from the roster and that is the ONLY time that you can delete names and facilities. That time is when you are registering your club for the first time each year. After you have paid for your club, you <u>cannot</u> delete any names or facilities. That includes any members that passed during the year, left your club for another club or who just stopped dancing.

The next issue is accidents. In the past we have told the clubs that when a dancer arrives at the dance they are covered once they leave their car. But that has changed. According to the insurance company now, the dancer must be in the facility where the dance is occurring.

What do you do if you need a replacement certificate or a certificate for a new facility. If you need one for a new facility you should go into the portal and add the facility. Send an email to let me know that you need a copy of the new certificate. If you have lost your certificates, email me and I will send the certificates to you again. It's that simple.

I will be keeping limited hours between now and October 1. Saturday and Sunday's I am off; emails will be checked Monday thru Saturday. You may call me at 706-759-3642 (it is not a FAX) but remember I am in the Eastern Time Zone. No calls after 9pm Eastern Time. I promise I won't call the Pacific Time Zone people at 9am Eastern when it is 6am Pacific Time. Likewise those in the Pacific and Mountain Time Zone be aware of what time you are calling me.

There will be dates in June when I will not be available by phone while traveling and attending the 72<sup>nd</sup> NSDC. Those dates are June 18 thru 30.


